## Willis Mays searching for his aunt Sophia and uncles Ruben Grimes and John Ray

Willis Mays placed this ad in the *Southwestern Christian Advocate* in 1885. The Methodist Episcopal Church published the *Southwestern Christian Advocate* every week from 1877 to 1929. This African American newspaper published thousands of "Lost Friends" ads between November 1879 and November 1896, as formerly enslaved people tried to reconnect with their families and friends.

Mays infers that his search for his aunt and uncles is on his mother's behalf. Although it is unclear under what circumstances the siblings parted, they all made (or were presumed to have made) their way to Texas after emancipation.
