This ad appeared in *The Christian Recorder*, the oldest continuously published African American newspaper in the United States. Although the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME) published *The Christian Recorder*, much of its content focused on secular issues that affected the African American community.

Reverend H. S. Roberts placed this ad in 1902, thirty-seven years emancipation. Roberts's ad reveals that his son left Virginia in 1865, presumably after the conclusion of the Civil War. Although he does not identify a specific destination, he knew that his son went "North," likely in search of economic opportunity.
